
The border lakes on the edge of Egypt's Nile delta contain sites favored by most scholars for the miraculous Exodus sea crossing.



The coast of the Gulf of Aqaba at Nuweiba Beach. If the miraculous sea parting took place here, it would be bigger than anyone could imagine.




The monastery of St. Catherine's at the site of the traditional Mt. Sinai in the Sinai Peninsula.

One of England's preeminent geographers, Charles Beke, searched for the route of the Exodus journey out of Egypt in the 19th century.




